Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

At Coton Green Primary School, we aim to offer a stimulating and inspiring learning environment to all our pupils, where they feel safe and ready to learn. All pupils experience a broad, balanced curriculum which engages and motivates them. All staff at Coton Green have high expectations of all pupils, and pupils have high aspirations for their own future. Our main aim is that the attainment and progress of disadvantaged pupils at Coton Green Primary School is at least in line with their peers with similar starting points who are now eligible for the Pupil Premium.

All children have access to high quality first teaching to enable them to thrive academically and socially. In order to do this, we engage in a range of strategies to issue challenge at an appropriate level and provide support to overcome barriers to learning.

Key interventions and approaches are adopted on a whole school level. Our strategies target the individualised needs of our children in receipt of Pupil Premium where funding is allocated within the school budget by financial year. The budget enables us to plan our intervention and support programme year on year, based on the needs of the current cohort of children in receipt of Pupil Premium funding.

At Coton Green our current strategy prioritises teaching of core skills such as early reading and mathematical conceptual understanding. Funding also provides equal opportunities to the wider curriculum such as subsidised music tuition. In addition to this, access to specialist services for disadvantaged pupils is also provided. E.g. EWW support, family support and specialist teaching. Coton Green also acknowledges the importance of supporting teachers with high quality CPD, resources and evidence-based approaches to the curriculum, in order to improve the outcomes for children.

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	In some subjects and in some year groups, current data shows that there is a gap developing between PP and non-PP. I.e.: Current Y4 Maths (50% 83%) Current Y5 Reading +Writing (57% 70%) Current Year 6 Reading (67% 89%) maths. (50% 74%)
2	KS1 attainment was lower than other cohorts showing the impact of Covid particularly on these year groups. School has ambitious and challenging targets for pupils in Year3 for Reading for 2022 – 2023.
3	The attendance for PP children 2021-22 was 93% Even though attendance for most year groups is above national for Pupil Premium children, the school has set an attendance target of 97% for the academic year of 2022-23.
4	The PP group in school have complex family circumstances that impact pupil's welfare. For example, the PP group have a dis-proportionate amount of pupils accessing further support through LAC (Looked After Children), Early Help, Malachi Support or Child Protection.





5	Mobility: Pupil Premium children who join Coton Green from another setting historically perform less well than those who have been at the school since EYFS. This group has higher mobility than non-pupil premium
6	As a result of Covid-19 restrictions, pupils social, emotional and mental and physical health is less developed. This has impacted on pupil's behaviour for learning, self-esteem and independence.
7	Parents have also been isolated from school, especially those from a dis-advantaged background themselves. This has in some cases and dis-proportionately to the PP group led to less engagement in education (e.g. attendance at Parent consultations, PP homework, MS Teams).

Intended outcomes

This explains the outcomes we are aiming for **by the end of our current strategy plan**, and how we will measure whether they have been achieved.

This is the case for all prior attainment groups. This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2021 to 2022 academic year.

There has been good progress in our intended outcomes for the disadvantaged children who attend Coton Green Primary School.

The table above outlines that pupil Premium children are broadly in line with their peers across the school, although this is variable across the year groups and the subjects. High quality teaching and targeted support have all impacted positively across the school.

Reading:

Reading has been a priority for the school, rightly so as we believe this gives all children access to all curriculum areas. School led tutoring and other funded interventions, based on accelerating progress in reading, have led to Disadvantaged pupils reading well, as well as their peers, at all levels across the school. The impact of this has been shown in the school's outcomes:

- EYFS 80% disadvantaged children ARE
- Y1 Phonics- 100% disadvantaged passed. 97% whole school.
- Y2 Re-take phonics. 100% Pupil Premium passed. 100% whole school.
- KS1 Pupil Premium are in line with non-Pupil Premium within school.
- KS2 At the end of KS2, disadvantaged children made accelerated progress to match their peers attainment in school. This exceeded the national attainment for all pupils of 74%

Pupil Premium were targeted directly for school led tutoring. 35 (75%) Pupil Premium children took the offer of teacher led tutoring during Spring and Summer terms. Children made good progress in these teacher led groups. For example: In the Read Write Inc teacher led sessions in Year 1 and 2, 100% pupil premium children made expected progress, while 60% made accelerated progress.

Social, Emotional and Mental Health:

Well targeted and effective pastoral support has meant that many of the pupils, both pupil premium and non-pupil premium, have been appropriately supported. Nearly half of the children that are disadvantaged are able to be supported by the pastoral leads within school. Successes have meant that children with social and emotional needs have been identified. Over a third of pupil premium children have been engaged in extra-curricular activities and had opportunities to represent their peers on School Council and as House Captains. This compares favourably with their peers in school.

Attendance and punctuality have been monitored by Senior Leadership team who have worked closely with the Staffordshire Local Authority Education Welfare Officer. The attendance for Pupil Premium children this year has been 93%. This in line with the whole school's figure of 94.2%. Attendance for most year groups is above the national for pupil premium children.

Strategic leadership is the key driver in the successes. For example: Read Write Inc Leader has dedicated leadership time for assessing spot-light children which includes those who are Pupil Premium.

Moving our Pupil Premium children forward, the school is now using the high-quality teaching, targeted support, School led tutoring in the areas of writing and Maths for children moving into Y4 and Y6.
